Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of Apolacon Township have adopted the following resolution:

DESIGNATION OF L.W.BARTON LIMESTONE MOUND AS A SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY HISTORICAL, EDUCATIONAL, AND CULTURAL SITE

A RESOLUTION OF THE APOLACON TOWNSHIP SUPERVISORS, APOLACON TOWNSHIP, SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, PROVIDES THAT THE AREA CURRENTLY KNOWN AS THE ASHCRAFT QUARRY, HISTORICALLY KNOWN AS THE LITTLE MEADOWS LIME KILN IN APOLACON TOWNSHIP, SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA BE DESIGNATED THE L.W.BARTON LIMESTONE MOUND AS A HISTORICAL, EDUCATIONAL, AND CULTURAL SITE IN HONOR OF THE MAN WHO FIRST DEVELOPED THIS AREA FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE LOCAL FARMING COMMUNITY IN THE LATE 1800'S. THIS SITE FOR THE PAST SEVERAL GENERATIONS HAS BECOME AN IMPORTANT EDUCATIONAL AND GEOLOGICAL SITE USED BY A NUMBER OF UNIVERSITIES FOR THE TRAINING OF FUTURE GEOLOGISTS IN UNDERSTANDING THE GEOLOGIC EVOLUTION OF THIS NORTH AMERICAN CONTINENT.

SECTION ONE - SITE DESIGNATION

The area in Apolacon Township, Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania currently known as the Ashcraft Quarry, and known historically as the Little Meadows Limestone Kiln is hereby designated the L.W.Barton Historic, Educational, and Cultural site. Information pertaining to the unique geology of this site can be found in the September, 1981 New York State Geological Association Guidebook.

SECTION TWO - PRESERVATION

The current owners of the land and mineral rights are encouraged to take precautions to ensure the continued preservation of this significant historical, educational, and cultural site, so as to preserve this area for the benefit of future generations to study the unique geological characteristics that are exposed at this site. At the time when funding becomes available, it is recommended that this

site be permanently preserved as a park at the township, county, state or national level as appropriate, with the cooperation of the then current owners of the land and mineral rights. Any activities which potentially impact the cultural, educational, or historic value of this site will be opposed by the Susquehanna County Board of Commissioners in accordance with Article I, Section 27 of the Pennsylvania Constitution.

SECTION THREE - CONTINUED ACCESS TO THE SITE

The current and future owners of the land and mineral rights are encouraged to continue to grant permission to individuals and universities and other bodies engaged in public education for the continued study of this uniquely significant environment.
